Renting a Church for Friday and Eid Prayers

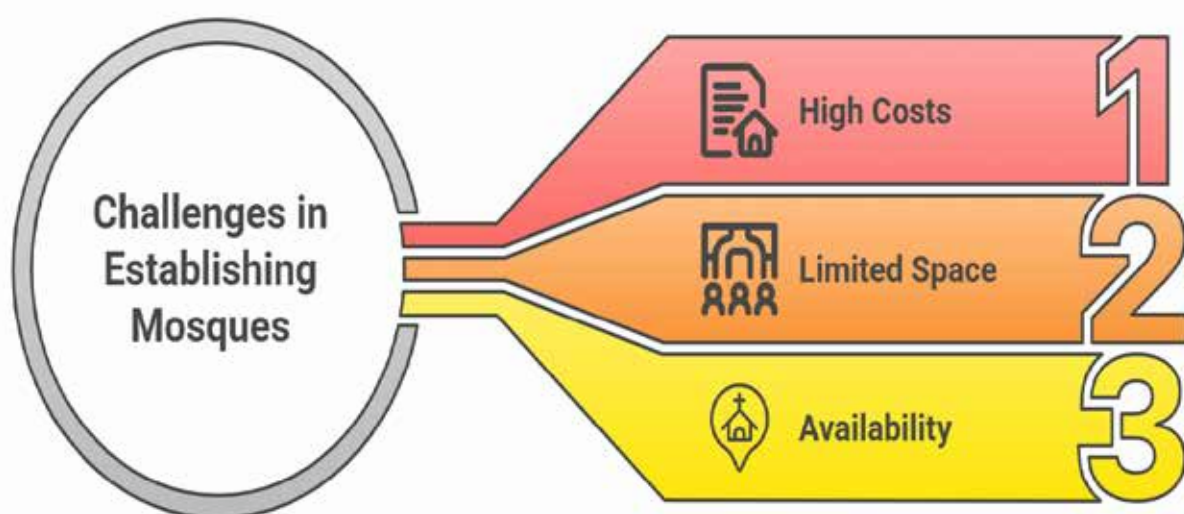
In many Western countries, high real estate prices and limited availability of suitable spaces make it difficult for Muslim communities to establish their own mosques. Key issues include:

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Rulings and Scholarly Opinions

Other scholars discourage or prohibit praying in non-Muslim places of worship, citing concerns about the sanctity and appropriateness of such locations. Their arguments include:

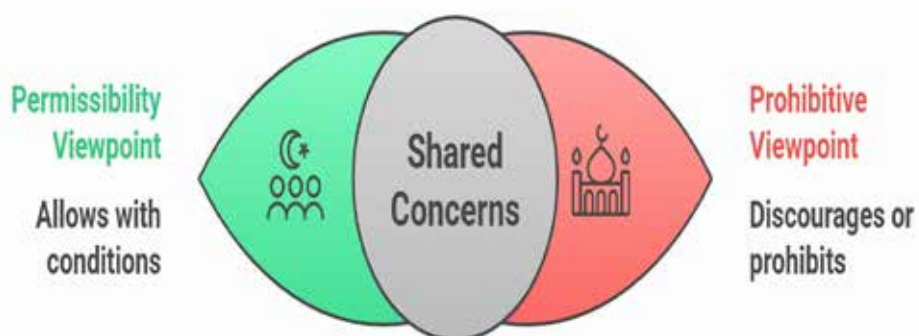
Sanctity: Non-Muslim places of worship may contain symbols or elements contrary to Islamic beliefs.

Purity: Ensuring the place is free from physical impurities and distractions.



Scholars like Shaikh Jad al-Haq Ali Jad al-Haq and Shaikh Mahmood Shaltoot have expressed reservations about using non-Muslim places of worship for Muslim prayers.

Flexibility: Ensuring Muslims can gather for congregational prayers despite logistical challenges.

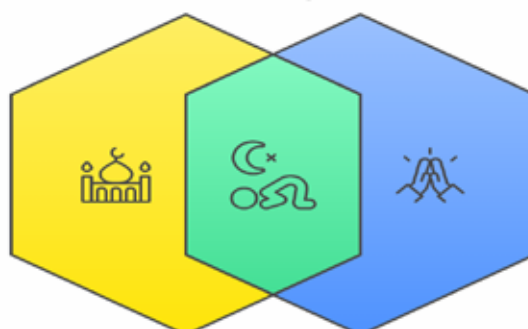

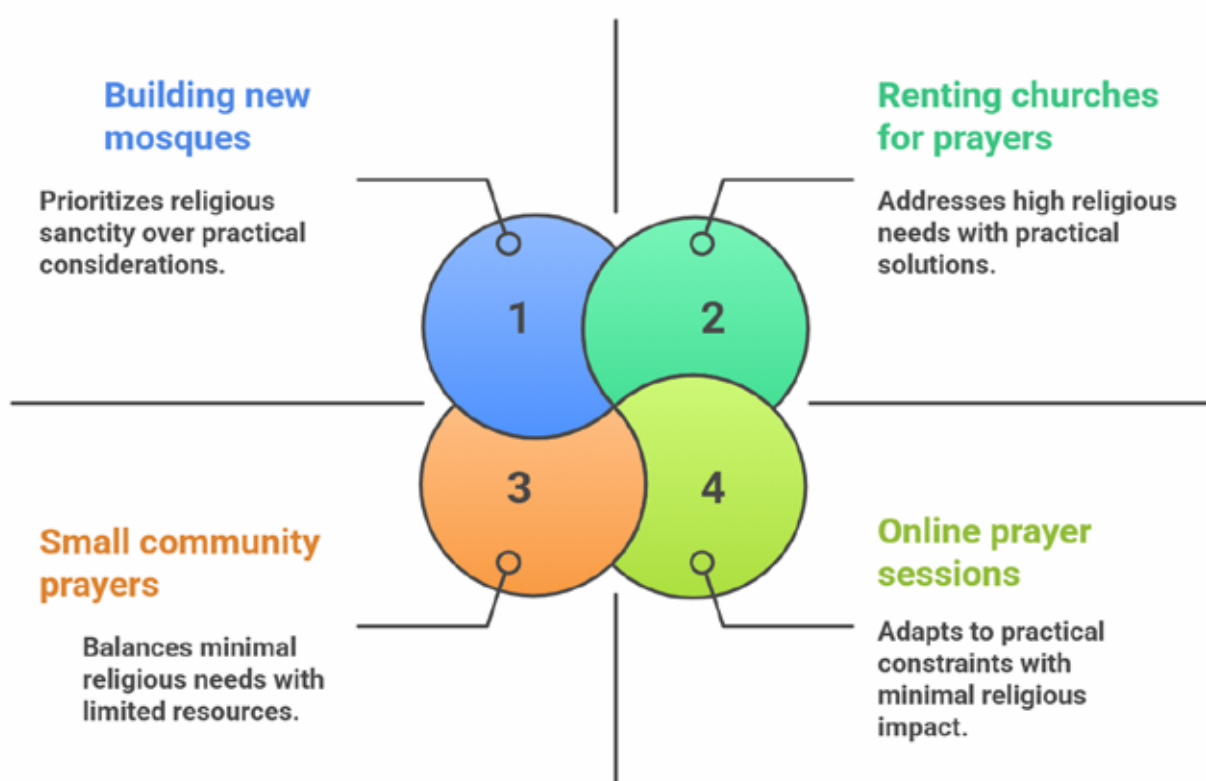
